## Scholarship Application Tips

Winning scholarships takes discipline, organization and drive. Follow the application tips below to help you get started!

- Write a winning essay
  - Opportunity to tell the scholarship committee why you are a good fit, how it will help you, and how you will benefit them. Prove why you are investment worthy.
  - Research the scholarship and the organization behind it.
  - Get it proofread.
- Gather letters of recommendation
  - Think of someone you have formed a good relationship with that could speak on behalf of your character and growth as a person and/or student.
  - Ask a faculty member, coach, employer, etc.
  - Give them 3-4 weeks to write your letter.
- Apply early and often!
- Follow the directions.
- Watch deadlines.
- Apply with a buddy and hold each other accountable.
- Avoid scams!
  - Never pay to apply for a scholarship.
  - Never provide personally identifiable information.
  - No one can guarantee you a scholarship.
- Think of applying as a part time job. If you win a \$1,000 scholarship after 20 hours of searching and applying, you got paid \$50/hour.
- Be gracious.
